

RHIM CAUTIOUS MODEL FACTSHEET


The RHIM Cautious model aims to deliver capital growth over the medium term, with lower volatility than the sector average using collective investment schemes (funds). Asset allocation will be actively managed whilst maintaining a cautious risk profile. This is a multi-asset portfolio which may invest between 25% and 45% in traditional equity funds which will include UK and overseas equities. The remainder will be invested in lower risk funds such as targeted absolute return funds and at least 35% across fixed income and property. The model is also permitted to hold up to 10% in cash when deemed appropriate. In order to deliver returns in excess of cash over the longer term investors must accept that the investment could fall in value, particularly in the short term. The model will sit within risk profile 4 on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is cash and 10 is 100% high risk equity markets. Please see the reverse for historical volatility and peak to trough data.



Commentary


October was a negative month for equities with the FTSE 100 falling 4.9%. There were few places to hide as bonds also delivered negative returns. After several years of very strong returns from equity markets, higher interest rates in the US and some growth concerns relating to China and the Eurozone are causing some volatility. Trade wars between China and the US have also effected sentiment. So, whilst markets rose strongly into the start of this year, the summer has been more volatile. We have been actively reducing European equity exposure since late 2017 and have very little exposure to Asia or emerging markets in this model; areas that have been under pressure this year. That said, emerging markets are looking increasingly attractive due to their lower valuations on a longer term view, particularly those not sensitive to China's growth trajectory. We have been building a small position in a gold fund as downside risks have increased. Over the last 12 months Polar Capital Global Convertibles, RWC Enhanced Income and Newton Global Income stood out, each delivering over 6%. The lower risk portion of the model (fixed income and Targeted Absolute Return) have served to protect capital during the equity market volatility.


