


RHIM ENTERPRISE MODEL FACTSHEET

The RHIM Enterprise model aims to achieve long term capital growth by investing in collective investment schemes. This is a multi-asset portfolio with an equity weight of between 60% and 85% which will involve investing in UK and overseas equities, including emerging markets. In seeking higher returns, the model may also utilise specialist sectors which may experience periods of higher volatility. However, the model will also hold between 15%-40% in medium or lower risk investments such as targeted absolute return funds, fixed interest and/or property. The model will sit within risk profile 6 on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is cash and 10 is 100% high risk equity markets. Investors accept that this model has historically experienced volatility of around 10% per annum. Please see the reverse for historical volatility and peak to trough data.



Commentary **August 2019 UPDATE**

The Enterprise model rose 5.0% over the three months to August 2019 as US equities and gold generated strong returns. The Artemis US Select fund was up 14% in the period and the Merian Gold & Silver fund 44%. The equity market decline in August offset some of the gains from June and July. Economic data was weak in the month while politics, again, had a decisive influence. President Trump increased tariffs on China, Brexit fears returned and Argentina voted against its pro-market president. The latter two events helped the UK and emerging market stockmarkets underperform the other regional markets. Global growth fears meant that defensive companies like healthcare names outperformed cyclical sectors like energy and mining. Bond yields fell sharply with this weakening backdrop, helped by interest rate cuts and talk of additional easing by central banks. This was a tailwind for the model's Strategic Bond and infrastructure funds. The Jupiter Strategic Bond fund was up 2.6% and the Foresight UK Infrastructure fund was up 1.5%. The ongoing rise in negative-yielding debt helped the Merian Gold & Silver fund rise 8% in August. Over the year, the model was up 3.5% as US equities recovered their losses from the second half of 2018 and the emerging market bond fund made 20%. Many regional equity markets remain in negative territory over the year.


