

RHIM BLENDED MODEL FACTSHEET

The RHIM Blended model aims to produce moderate levels of capital growth over the medium term with lower volatility than the IA sector average, investing in collective investment schemes. This is a multi-asset global portfolio with an equity weight between 45% and 65% which will include overseas equity exposure. The model will also typically use targeted return funds in order to reduce volatility associated with equity investing and at least 20% will be invested in fixed interest and/or property as deemed appropriate. Asset allocation will be actively managed whilst maintaining a balanced risk profile. Investors should be comfortable with periods of volatility, although this is expected to be lower than a pure equity portfolio. The model will sit within risk profile 5 on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is cash and 10 is 100% in high risk equity markets. Please see the reverse for historical volatility and peak to trough data.




Commentary

September 2019 UPDATE

The Blended model was up 1.4% over the last three months. Economic data across the world has started to weaken significantly but this has prompted central banks to cut interest rates and buy government debt again in the case of the European Central Bank and the U.S. Federal Reserve. This has pushed bond yields down and bond prices up and lower borrowing costs have made it cheaper for companies to buy their shares back. Japanese equities were the strongest market, up 6% over the three months, as the Japanese yen tends to strengthen when the global economy weakens. US equities were also up more than 4% as companies bought more of their shares back. In the UK, the FTSE All-Share was up 1.3% as Brexit went to the top of investor concerns while emerging markets were hit by political upheaval in Argentina and Brazil. The gold price pulled back in September but the Merian Gold & Silver fund was still the best performing fund in the quarter, up 16%. Over the year to September, the Blended model was up 2.8% as equity and fixed income markets have risen. U.S. equities have been the strongest and emerging markets have been weakest as the US-China trade war took hold and the U.S. dollar strengthened. We believe that this trend could reverse if the U.S. Federal Reserve is forced to fund the U.S. government's deficits.


Risk Return (5 years) as at 30th September 2019


