RHIM DYNAMIC MODEL FACTSHEET

The RHIM Dynamic model aims to produce an attractive level of capital growth over the medium term with lower volatility than the IA sector, investing in collective investment schemes. This is a multi-asset global portfolio with an equity weight of between 50% and 75% which will involve investing in UK and overseas equities, including emerging markets. However, the model will typically also use targeted absolute return funds in order to reduce volatility associated with equity investing and at least 15% will be also invested in fixed interest and/or property as deemed appropriate. Asset allocation will be actively managed around the higher side of medium risk profile. This means investors should be comfortable with periods of volatility, although this is expected to be lower than a pure equity portfolio. The model will sit within risk profile 5 on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is cash and 10 is 100% high risk equity markets. Please see the reverse for historical volatility and peak to trough data.

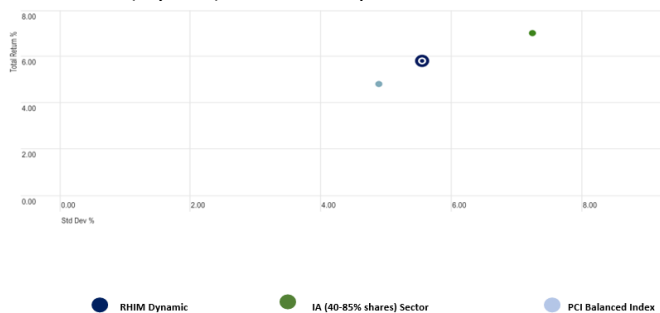


Commentary

November 2019 UPDATE

The Dynamic model was down 0.1% over the last three months as the emerging market exposure in both equities and fixed income offset the gains made on UK equities and property. Bond yields ticked up as inflation expectations mounted following the attack on Saudi oil infrastructure and the M&G Emerging Markets Bond fund was down 4.2%. Emerging markets also struggled as Trump talked of more tariffs on China, Mexico and Brazil and U.S. Congress signed a bill in support of the Hong Kong protesters. UK equities, though, had a good three months as Johnson agreed a Brexit deal with the European Union. The relief rally pushed UK equities and sterling higher. This was a particular fillip for smaller, UK-focused businesses. The FTSE 250 index of smaller companies was up 8.1% but the Liontrust UK Micro-Cap and Man GLG UK Income funds were up more than 10% while the Franklin and JO Hambro funds were up 7%. The FTSE 100 index of large multinational businesses was up 2.9% as the rise in sterling from \$1.20 to \$1.29 meant that overseas assets were worth less in sterling terms. Over the year, the Dynamic model was up 8.0% as equities and bonds have risen on the back of easier monetary conditions even though the global economy has slowed.

Performance Chart since inception



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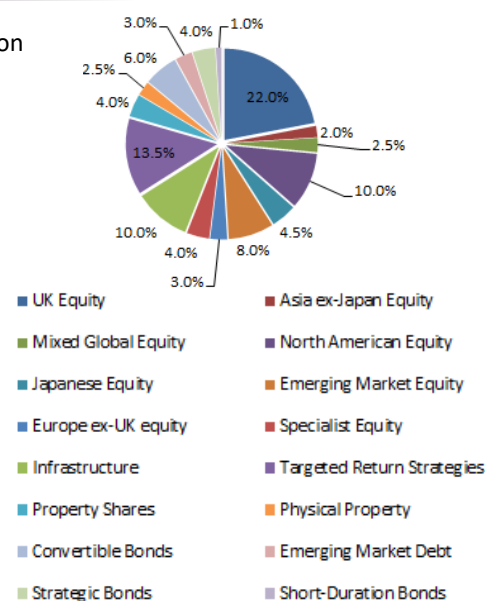
