

RHIM STRATEGIC MODEL FACTSHEET

The RHIM Strategic model is a defensive multi-asset portfolio which aims to generate growth ahead of inflation over a rolling 3 year period yet operate with a low level of volatility, using collective investment schemes (funds). The emphasis is on capital preservation and steady returns. The majority of the model will be invested in lower risk funds, with a maximum of 30% permitted in traditional equity funds. Targeted absolute return funds and fixed income will be used, in addition to property and cash as deemed appropriate. Asset allocation will be actively managed whilst maintaining a low risk profile. Any falls in the value of a portfolio should usually be small. However, potential returns are also likely to be modest. The model will sit within risk profile 3 on a scale of 1-10, where 1 is cash and 10 is 100% in emerging markets. Please see the reverse for historical volatility and peak to trough data.


Commentary

January 2020 UPDATE

The Strategic model was up 1.4% over the three months to January as UK equities rose in the run-up to the general election in December but then fell back in January as the Brexit negotiations re-started. The smaller UK companies performed particularly well. The larger companies were weaker given their US dollar and energy exposure. The real asset funds generated returns between 2-4% over the last three months, performing better than the absolute return and fixed income funds they replaced. The renewable energy assets were weak as energy prices fell but the infrastructure assets did well. The gold equity fund performed strongly up to the New Year when the USA-Iran tensions escalated, but it pulled back in January, even though the gold price rose 5%. Gold is a hedge against rising inflation and interest rates that would be a headwind for both fixed income and equities. The strategic bond funds were up 1-2% over the last three months. The Strategic model was up 4.5% over the year to 31 January 2020, 3.1% ahead of UK CPI.


Risk Return (5 years) as at 31st December 2019

Performance Chart since inception


